Trauma Informed Commitment

Thanks to global advances in mental health treatment, we now have better knowledge of the lasting and significant effects of trauma. We also know that every person has experienced some level of trauma. Over the past several years, Vista Maria has made strides in creating a trauma informed environment for all that receive care, or work, in our programs. In order to be effective in our treatment, everyone at Vista Maria from our accountants and facilities crew to our therapists and counselors participate in regular training and must practice trauma informed care. All of our interactions with parents, youth, referral workers, and judges focus on the trauma informed approach. We are committed to our philosophy of care and trauma informed practice which is evidenced by our vision and mission statements.

OUR VISION: All children, families and communities achieve success through learning and restorative relationships that promote personal, professional and family well-being.

OUR MISSION: We deliver innovative care, treatment, and education focused on restorative relationships so that vulnerable youth believe in their worth, heal and build the skills for success.

Our philosophy of care defines the framework of our service delivery and continuum of care. In conjunction with our core values and philosophy of care, our service delivery has become further enhanced with extensive training in trauma informed care through the Risking Connection and Trauma Informed Implemented Practice (TRIP) models. In 2018, 80% of employees were trained in TRIP while 89% have been trained in Risking Connection. These models have impacted how Vista Maria employees interact with one another, speak and deliver care.



Together, we celebrated our 135th anniversary as an organization committed to the support, treatment and education of women and children. Over the years, we have held fast to our values that were embodied by Sr. Mary Euphrasia and the Sisters of the Good Shepherd over 200 years ago. The notion that every person has value is critical to us. We also practice acts of mercy and compassion by not judging or defining others. We look beyond behaviors to see what individuals need. We also practice reconciliation, which is not just forgiving, but forgiveness and reunification. Zeal exemplifies our passion for continuous support of the dreams and potential of our young people. During 2018, we were able to refine our values work and care philosophy by engaging in an agency-wide trauma informed training and practice. Always looking beyond the harm, beyond our personal needs and ego is not easy, but it is common sense care, hope and healing.

Today, we are able to support our approach through neuro-science as well as best practice models of care. We have trained all of our employees and gone even further to launch training programs for foster parents, youth, board members, and volunteers that will continue well beyond 2018 and 2019. You might also note the changes in our mission and vision statements initiated by employees. Improving our knowledge and understanding of trauma, disrupted development, and the need for restorative relationships will improve staff retention, programmatic outcomes, and youth success for vears to come.

As you review the 2018 Annual Report, you will note the significant accomplishments of the Vista Maria team. We are proud of the dedication to learning, problem solving and teamwork exhibited by employees. Through the collective effort of our more than 300 employees, 18 board directors, 50 advisors, and 2,000 volunteers and donors, we have been able to empower young people to succeed in treatment and education so that they are able to launch their college or career plans. What's on Vista Maria's Horizon?

Vista Maria is always looking for ways to address the unmet needs of our youth and improve our service delivery. A key improvement for the care of rescued female survivors of human trafficking is the construction of a new human trafficking stabilization treatment center on Vista Maria's campus. The Aaron and Helen L. DeRoy Treatment Center will be a victim-focused treatment center where care is centralized for adolescent female survivors of human trafficking. Vista Maria has raised more than \$3 million of the RESTORE capital campaign goal. Scheduled to open in early 2020, the new \$4.8 million building, equipped with an emergency intake wing, will be the largest residential building on campus and will expand Vista Maria's capacity to concurrently serve more than 30 females survivors of human trafficking. This expansion of services would not be possible without generous supporters in our community. We are grateful for lead gifts from the DeRoy Testamentary Foundation, Carls Foundation and the McGregor Fund.
