From Warmth to Worth: What the Knights of Columbus Make Possible at Vista Maria

For 142 years, Vista Maria has been a steady presence for young people and families who needed someone in their corner. Founded in 1883 by the Sisters of the Good Shepherd, we began as a single home for girls in Detroit and have grown into a mission-driven organization serving youth and families across southeast Michigan. While our programs have evolved, our focus remains the same: to walk with each young person in faith, care, and a steadfast belief in their individual worth. Today, we help youth facing cycles of trauma and instability by not only providing services, but a place where they are encouraged and empowered to move forward.

Our story began with five Sisters of the Good Shepherd who came to Detroit to care for young girls and women society had cast aside. They opened the House of the Good Shepherd, offering shelter, education, and guidance to those in need. As the need for care grew, the Sisters expanded their work to a new campus in Dearborn Heights, which was gifted by Henry and Clara Ford. In 1942, the organization was renamed Vista Maria.

That same spirit of fearless compassion still drives us today, as our services have grown to meet the ever-evolving needs of youth in Michigan. Vista Maria cannot accomplish our mission alone. We depend on committed supporters like you. The It can be messy, painful, and incredibly difficult. But at Vista Maria, we witness Knights of Columbus play an essential role in sustaining and expanding our impact. Since 2021, your generous support through the Coats for Kids program has kept hundreds of youth warm-both on our campus and in foster care throughout the community. These coats do more than provide comfort; they send a powerful message that every child is seen, valued, and cared for.

We support young people who have experienced severe trauma, abuse, neglect, or exploitation. Many arrive at our doors having cycled through numerous placements, institutional care, or unsafe environments. For some, it's the first place they feel safe, supported, and unconditionally valued.

Vista Maria offers a full range of care designed to meet youth where they are and help them move forward with dignity and purpose:

- Foster care and adoption programs that prioritize stability and lifelong connections. We support both foster families and birth families, with a focus on reunification when possible and permanency when necessary.
- Recovery programs for adolescent survivors of human trafficking, including specialized residential care. Vista Maria operates one of the few facilities in Michigan offering comprehensive treatment and stabilization services for youth who have experienced exploitation.
- Transitional and independent living programs that support youth aging out of foster care and prepare them for adulthood. These include supervised group living, apartment-based programs, and support from caring adults to help navigate life skills like education, employment, healthcare, and budgeting.
- Residential mental health treatment for youth with complex emotional and behavioral needs. This includes individualized treatment plans, clinical therapy, and support for education and wellness-all within a safe, structured, and trauma-informed environment.
- Iuvenile justice case management and community-based services through our newest program, InSight Youth and Family Connections. InSight supports court-involved youth and their families through home-based therapy, wraparound care, and restorative practices focused on reducing recidivism and increasing community connection.

In April 2025, Vista Maria merged with InSight Youth and Family Connections, a respected provider of juvenile justice and community-based services across southeast Michigan. InSight now operates as a program of Vista Maria, continuing

its mission to support youth and families involved with the justice system. The merger allows us to expand our impact, offer more prevention and intervention services, and create a more integrated continuum of care for youth across the region.

We often serve young people during the most difficult moments of their lives. Some have faced unimaginable abuse, have been trafficked or abandoned, or have never had a consistent adult believe in them. Vista Maria is often the first place where they feel secure, supported, and unconditionally valued.



Our approach is both deeply spiritual and intensely practical. We offer therapy, education, housing, life skills, and more. But perhaps most importantly, we provide compassion and a path forward. This work is essential. It helps youth break generational cycles and build lives grounded in purpose and possibility.

Healing from trauma requires extraordinary patience and commitment. Meredith Reese, our Chief Operations Officer and Interim Agency Lead, explains, "Healing is hard.

daily the transformative power that unfolds when caring adults consistently show up with empathy, patience, and understanding."



Each year, hundreds of young people find hope and possibility at Vista Maria. Jaedyn, a current resident in our Shepherd Hall Independent Living Program, shared, "Some advice that I would give future residents that come to Vista Maria is: this isn't a permanent place. It's a place to help you. It's not a punishment. You didn't do anything wrong. You had wrong things happen to you, and that's why you're here. The staff aren't here to tell you

what to do. They're here to help you figure out who you want to be." These words reflect a truth we see every day: when youth are surrounded by

care and support, they begin to believe in themselves again. They realize their future can be shaped by hope, not defined by what they've endured.



Dynisti, another young person in our care, came to Vista Maria after years of struggling with her mental health and bouncing between hospital stays. She shared, "I was having mental breakdowns at school, [and] around my mom and family. My mom didn't know what to do, so I kept getting sent to the hospital." After a few months in our residential program, Dynisti transitioned into Independent Living Plus. Now, she's focused on finishing high school and going to college for nursing. Dynisti also volunteers as an

assistant volleyball coach for younger girls on Vista Maria's campus. "I feel supported by Vista a hundred percent," she said. "Now my siblings look at me and say, 'Wow. I want to be like her.'"

Stories like Jaedyn's and Dynisti's show why Vista Maria exists. They prove that healing is possible and that, with steady encouragement from a community of people who care about them, youth can rise above their trauma and become leaders for others.

Sr. Janice Rushman, RGS, who works closely with the youth and lives on our campus, reminds us: "Our loving Creator does not always extend the divine hand directly to us, but so often gives us help and strength through friends and supporters, who stand with us in this Holy Work."

That support makes a lasting difference. Your involvement-through advocacy, volunteering, or giving-helps youth reclaim their dignity and build lives filled with purpose. We invite the Knights of Columbus to continue walking beside us. When others step back, you step in. And no child should face their future alone. We deeply value our Catholic roots, the resilience of the youth we serve, and the partnership of committed supporters like you.
